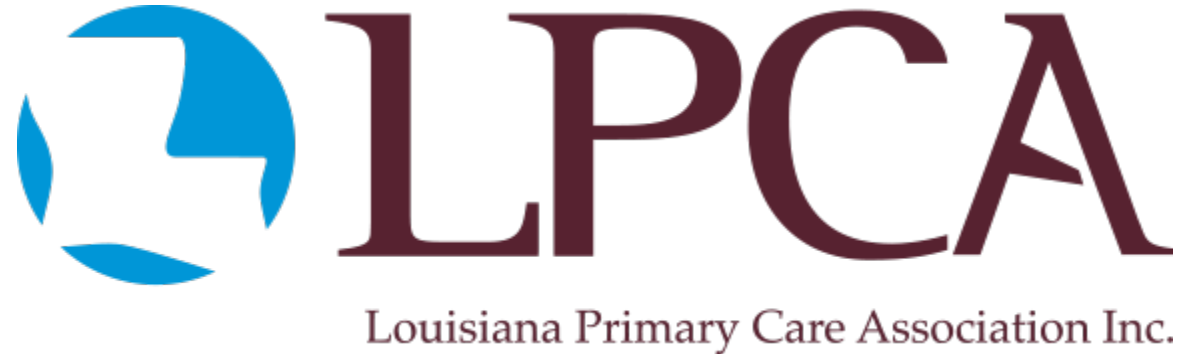

Health Disparities

- An illness or issue that impacts some races/ethnicities, genders and groups more than others.
- Does not mean the illness or issue is exclusive to a group or other groups are not impacted
- A health disparity refers to a higher burden of illness, injury, disability, or mortality experienced by one group relative to another. (Kaiser Family Foundation)

Louisiana population data: 4,663,461

61.2% are White Americans

31.6% are Black/African Americans

4.9% are Hispanic/Latino

1.7% are Asians

0.6% are American Indian and Alaska
Natives

Health Disparities and COVID-19

Health Disparities, Social Determinants of Health and COVID-19

Employment Data (Work from Home)

- 16.2% of Hispanic
- 19.7% of black Americans
- 30% of whites
- 37% of Asian-Americans

Single parent homes, employee benefits, access to health care

Policy Implications

- Medicaid expansion (defend Medicaid initiatives and coalition)
- Minimum wage
- Paid sick leave

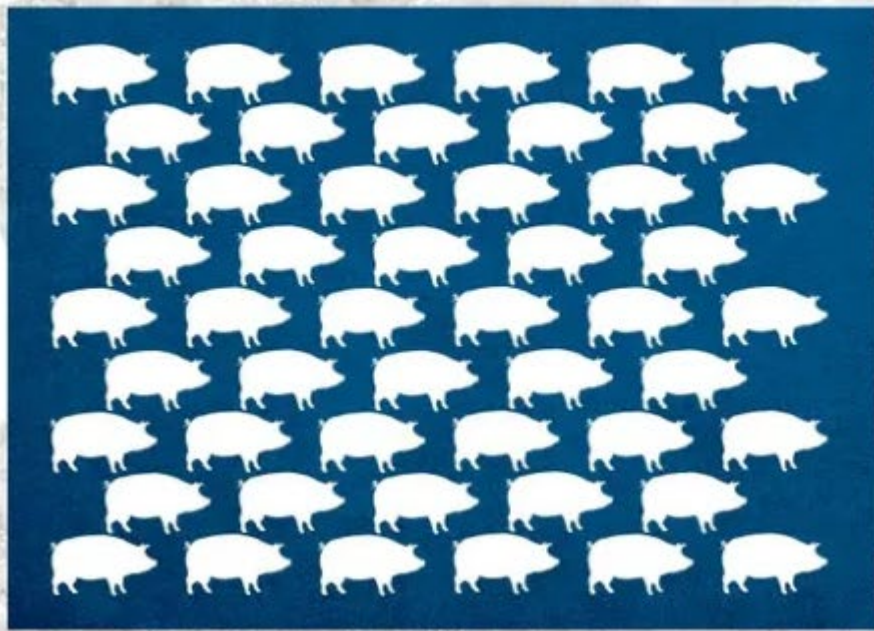

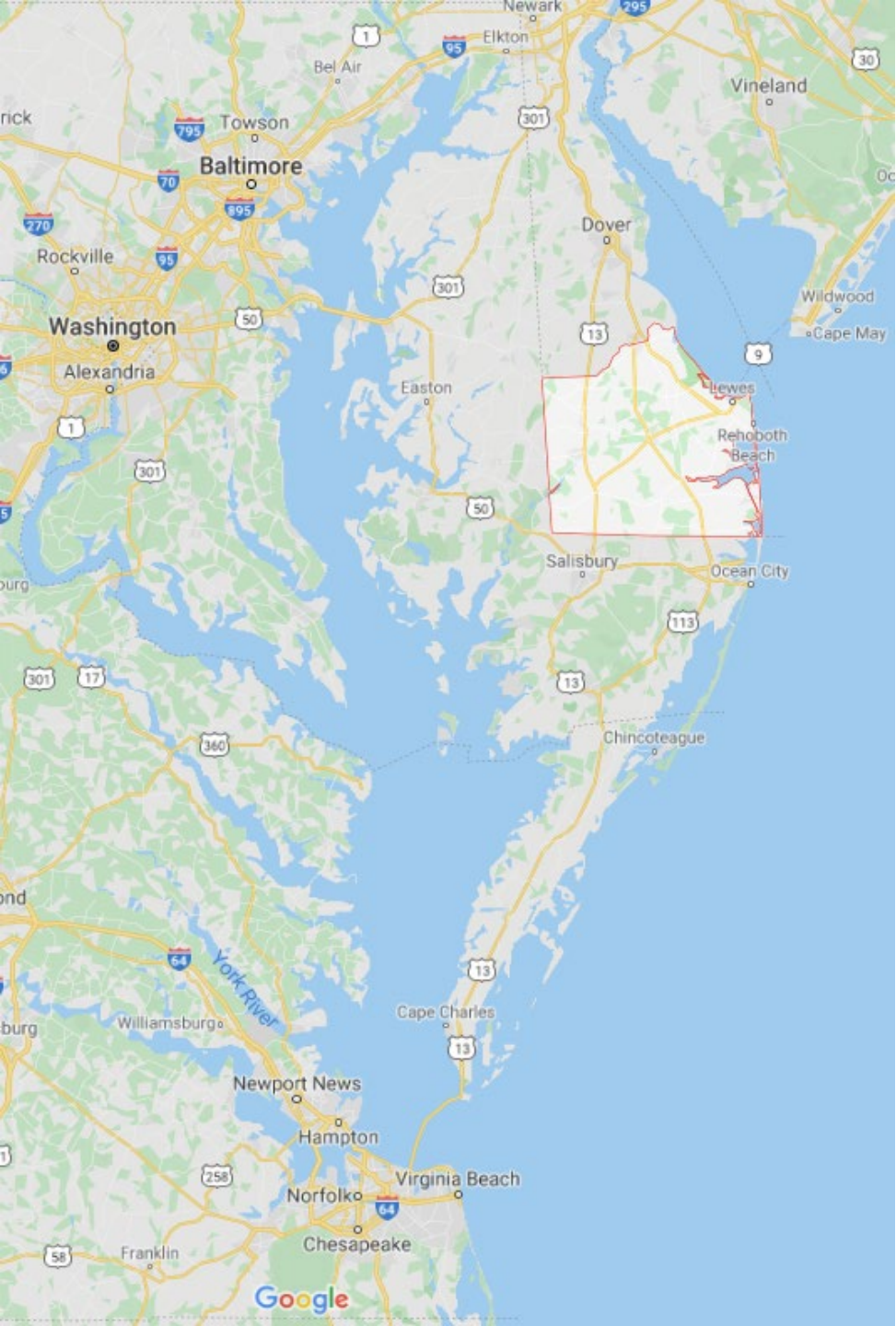

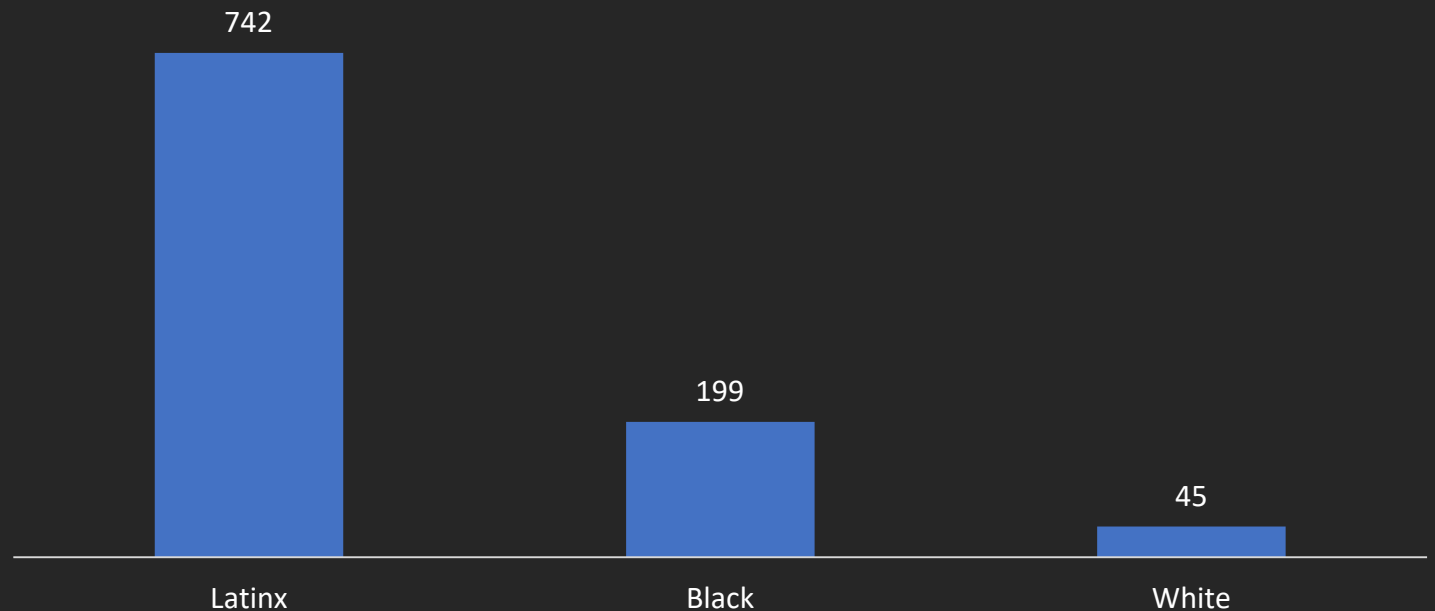

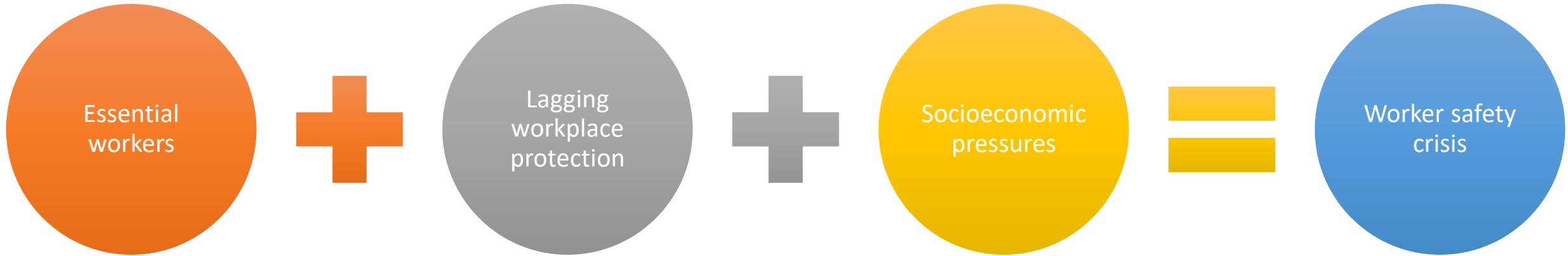
